Let me welcome you to the 2nd Biennial Conference of the European Association for Chinese Philosophy (EACP). The topic of this conference is "Global Chinese Philosophy". Today, Chinese Philosophy stands as a topic that attracts scholars from around the world and that is making impressive headway on finding its place in the established discipline of philosophy. But what is the appropriate place for Chinese philosophy? Would not the fact that Chinese Philosophy has become global lead to the conclusion that Chinese philosophy can by now be simply considered to be philosophy? Such a conclusion would be welcomed by some and give the shivers to others (very much depending on what is understood by the term 'philosophy'). This event is a great opportunity to learn about the diverse work of many scholars from all corners of Europe and beyond, and it is encouraging to see the impressive number of participants. We hope that this trend continues as we seek to

professionalize our association's work and to set ever higher standards for the study of Chinese philosophy in Europe.

Our association, however, is still young. It was founded at a conference on contemporary Confucianism in February 2014 in Ljubljana, Slovenia, organized by Jana Rošker. Last year, the inaugural conference, "Thinking across Borders: Philosophy and China" took place at Vilnius University in Lithuania, organized by Vytis Silius. There was a splendid and diverse program with keynotes delivered by Carine Defoort (Leuven) and Peng Guoxiang (Zhejiang). We are happy to host the second edition of the conference here in Basel and hope that you will enjoy - intellectually and otherwise - your time here in Basel. We believe that the conference features a very attractive and diverse program with keynotes that hopefully will spark discussion and critical debate. The Young Scholar Award, whose winners you find highlighted in the program, had many and many impressive submissions by young researchers, making the evaluation committee face some difficult choices.

"Beyond Confucian Delusions and Illusions. Critical Issues in Chinese Philosophy Today"

For three decades, contemporary China witnesses a Confucian revival, both in society and academia. Its repercussions can be observed in international discourses and philosophical research on Confucianism. A selective comparison with Confucian philosophy as it emerged in exile in the mid-20th century offers critical perspectives. With respect to social theory and political philosophy, these perspectives entail questions concerning such topics as self-cultivation, the functional differentiation in modern societies, political democracy, and last but not least our approach to traditional Confucian thought.

Thomas Fröhlich is Professor of Sinology at the University of Hamburg. He is the co-editor of the journal *Oriens Extremus*. His research focuses on the intellectual history and philosophy of modern and contemporary China and Taiwan. His publications deal with modern Confucianism, the political thought of Republican China, conceptions of progress in the first half of the twentieth century, Chinese intellectuals in exile, and anti-colonialism in Taiwan. His book *Tang Junyi: Confucian Philosophy and the Challenge of Modernity* has just appeared this year with Brill in the series on Modern Chinese Philosophy edited by John Makeham.

"Getting Through to a War-loving Ruler: The Mohists and their Elite Audiences"

Standard accounts of the Mohists portray them as presenting cool, rational arguments to make the case for their various ethical and political proposals (see e.g., Nivision, Hansen). While there is a lot of truth in the portrayal, it misses the crucial persuasive dimensions of the arguments preserved in the "Core Chapters". In addition, it also overlooks the possibility that the Mohists calibrated both the aims and the means of their persuasion to the specific audiences. In this talk, I will explore how the Mohists sought to reach out to two distinct audiences — moralistic members of the social elite ("the gentlemen of the world") as opposed to the actual warlike rulers of the states — on the issue of war.

Loy Hui-chieh is Associate Professor of Philosophy at National University of Singapore. His main research area is Early Chinese Philosophy, but he teaches and researches also Ancient Greek Philosophy, Early Modern and Contemporary Ethics and Political Philosophy. He is on the Editorial Board for Chinese Comparative Philosophy for *Philosophy Compass*. He has published articles on the *Mozi* and the *Lunyu* in the most prestigious journals of Chinese and Comparative Philosophy and has been featured in many handbooks and companions.


